GUEST SPEAKER DR. BEVERLY LORRAINE C. HO **OIC-UNDERSECRETARY, DOH**

Dr. Beverly "Bev" Lorraine Ho is the OIC-Undersecretary of the Public Health Services Team and concurrent Director IV of the Health Promotion Bureau of the Department of Health, where she has played a vital role in the country's battle against COVID-19.

She was also Special Assistant to the Health Secretary for Universal Health Coverage (UHC), where she served as the chief policy advisor on UHC implementation.

Prior to this, Dr. Bev is DOH's Chief of the Health Research Division of the Health Policy Development and Planning Bureau, where she designed innovative research grants and built institutional capacity for policy research.

She had worked with various international development agencies providing technical assistance on health financing, maternal and child health, and health impact assessment to the Philippines and the Greater Mekong Subregion.

She is a fellow of the Equity Initiative, an IAMP Young Physician Leader and a Fulbright scholar. She holds a Doctor of Medicine degree from the University of the Philippines and a Master's degree in Public Health from the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health.





PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

PinasLakas

After the past administration's successful RESBAKUNA vaccine demand generation campaign, it is now the turn of the Marcos government to continue the inoculation of the population against COVID-19.

As vaccines serve as the ultimate long-term solution to this pandemic, the Department of Health (DOH) continues to encourage every Filipino to get vaccinated against the deadly virus.

Thus, the DOH did not waste any time in launching a campaign that will continue the government's efforts to deliver safe, effective, and accessible vaccines for all Filipinos.

Two and a half months ago, on July 26, the government agency launched a stronger nationwide booster vaccination campaign dubbed "PinasLakas", which is the current administration's way of boosting the country's vaccination program to ensure a more health-conscious and safer nation.

In particular, PinasLakas aims to increase the number of Filipinos who have been given a COVID-19 booster shot, to help maintain the country's "wall of immunity".

Before the campaign, nearly 16 million Filipinos had been given the first booster shot, while over 1.2 million individuals mostly belonging to the vulnerable population (senior citizens, those with comorbidities, and healthcare workers) had received their second booster dose.

With PinasLakas, booster doses were now administered to a total of 20.2 million Filipinos as of October 10, data from the National COVID-19 Vaccination Dashboard show.

As DDB Group Philippines is one of the members of the private sector that have shared the goal of creating a healthier and safer Pilipinas, we have been part once again in the conceptualization of the PinasLakas campaign, especially the creative aspects of it. Following Resbakuna, DDB continues to be the creative agency for the DOH Health Promotion Bureau's vaccination campaigns.

For both Resbakuna and PinasLakas, we have been fortunate to have worked with our guest speaker for today, Dr. Beverly Lorraine Ho or Dr. Bev for short. She's the OIC-Undersecretary of the Public Health Services Team and concurrent Director IV of the Health Promotion Bureau of the DOH.

One of the soft-spoken leaders at the Department of Health, Dr. Bev makes sure that the DOH remains a constant source of information for the general public. She and her team make use of DOH's media and digital resources to ensure seamless information campaigns that enlighten Filipinos in making the correct decisions when it comes to their health.

This pandemic, Dr. Bev's unit has helped in making Filipinos understand and feel confident in the government's approach to roll-out COVID-19 vaccines; cultivating their trust in, and their demand for, the COVID-19 vaccines; making them recognize the role of vaccination in the country's COVID response; and making them rely on government-initiated platforms as the lead source of vaccine-related information.

Indeed, Dr. Bev has made a difference in improving the healthcare situation in the Philippines amid the pandemic and beyond.

Dr. Bev and her team help ensure the delivery of health services to the public. And for a breath of fresh air, in today's lunch meeting, she will be discussing "The 2030 Goal for Healthy Pilipinas and What Private Companies Can Do to Support".

Let's make sure we listen to what she has to say so, maybe, RCMW can later on do a joint initiative with DOH.

CARPE FUTURUM

Several years ago, I was invited to attend The World Economic Forum (WEF) in Indonesia. Throughout the conference, I knew I was in the presence of the best and brightest minds on the planet.

From that day forward, the WEF, as a learning institution, has been valuable to my career, inspiring me for years.

I recommend you make it your constant resource too: https://www.weforum.org/.

A WEF piece from a year or so back caught my eye, surrounding workforce management, triggered by the pandemic. It says, we'll all benefit from being taught new mindsets, behaviours and values. As always, crisis has been a catalyst for change.

The question is, at this time, to what degree are we prepared to change?

With not much time, I encourage us all to re-define the future of work. The learning of new skills must be purposeful. As always, I'm with the WEF and encourage you to contemplate how to positively embrace the opportunity we've been presented with during this pandemic.



My encouragement, rapidly upskill, even though many of us are well advanced in our careers. Can I suggest follow the advice our your IPP Franco and think about getting a reverse mentor. Four thoughts.

1. Change leadership and management competencies. I'm a bit older, which means I need to move faster, with energy and purpose. Perennials and millennials need to perpetually learn from each other – I'll call it co-learning.

2. Culture of trust, transparency and openness. We are working with less oversight these days, as control, to a significant degree, has given way to trust. Strangely, in a time of social distancing, we've gotten closer online. Now you don't need to be a tribe to be in a connected community.

3. Resilience. The World Health Organization recently found 45% of health workers in China are suffering from anxiety, with the prevalence of depression on the rise. Now, more than ever, we really do need to look out for each other. Business need to rebalance its priorities to ensure resilience becomes just as important to strategic thinking, and acting, as cost, profit and efficiency.

4. Agility. This is a gift that keeps giving. We've proven being cornered in an office may be counterproductive as it may impede the development of new skills, perpetuate dated mindsets, and perhaps enable behaviours that are no longer valuable.

In Race Against Death, A Raceway Plays a Part

ELMSFORD LMSFORD RACEWAY here has be-E Come almost a mandatory stop for some children who are, in effect, racing against death. So says Luis Del Rosario, owner with his wife, Barbara, Del Rosario, owner with his wile, baroara, of the model-car racing center on North Saw Mill River Road. As a member of the Elms-ford Rotary, Mr. Del Rosario has helped raise money to bring children from foreign countries to the United States for delicate, lifesaving heart surgery they could not get at home, either because of lack of money or lock of condical averative

In the Domisia surgery to repair a hole in his heart and five days in the hospital, Antonio visited the raceway and was en-thralled by the miniature cars zooming down and around on their little tracks. "He was so excited by the cars, the speed, the colors," Mr Del Rosario recalled "I spoke Spanish to him — I'm originally from the Philippines and we know a bit of many languages — and he laughed and played. It was amazing, because here was a boy who before his surgery had to sit down every few seconds just to catch his breath and now here he was, running and playing." 

Mr. Del Rosario went to a Jesuit high school and to New York University, married and settled in Westchester, but he never forgot his Philippine roots: on a visit there, he re-called, he was shaken by the poverty he saw. "It should not have happened to my coun-try, but it did," he said, referring to children begging in the streets, which he attributed to the indifference of Ferdinand Marcos, who at the time was the President of the Philip-pines. Mrs. Del Rosario said: "We're espe-

pines. Mrs. Del Rosario said: "We're espe-cially saddened by the plight of children there and everywhere. We have seven chil-dren of our own, and lots of grandchildren, and it's so hard to think of any young people in need.

The Gift of Life program started in 1975 The Gift of Life program started in 13% and is sponsored by Rotary Clubs Interna-tional. The first recipient was 5-year-old Grace Agwaru, who went from Uganda to Roslyn, L.I., where she underwent open-heart surgery at St. Francis Hospital. Since then 1,000 children have made similar trips. All children are accompanied by a parent or guardian. Generally, the surgery is donated by the doctors and hospitals involved, and by the doctors and hospitals motioned, the the money raised by Rotary is used for transportation and living costs at the home of a host family, said Alan Nemlich, a mem-ber of the Elmsford Rotary. Mr. Del Rosario added: "I think of Antonio, all excited. I really hope we can get lots of money for evilden like him."
