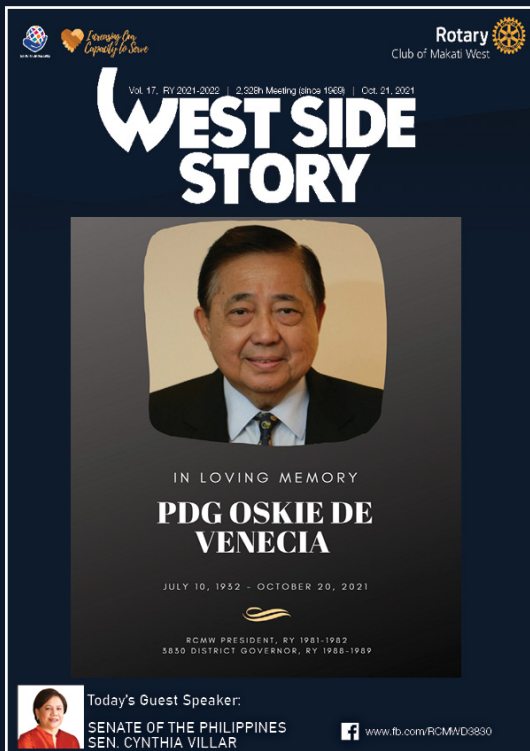


Oscar C. de Venecia was born on July 10, 1932. He was the thirteenth President of the Rotary Club of Makati West, RY 1981 – 1982. He was the District Governor at Rotary International District 3830 in 1988. PDG Oskie is a PIONEER POLIO PLUS AWARDEE presented by The Rotary Foundation.

During his presidency, he reaped international and district awards, namely: RI President's Special World Understanding Award (the first time a Philippine Rotary club to win a RI Award), the President Marcos Trophy to the outstanding club, RY 1981- 1982 and five District Service Award for the Club's five projects. During his term, Paul Harris Fellow increased from 38 to 53 members and the club's membership reached 109.

PDG Oskie received a graduate degree from Stanford University, an undergraduate degree from Mapua Institute of Technology and an undergraduate degree from Syracuse University."

COA : PHP565 billion gone in corruption

Kudos to the Commission on Audit (COA) for uncovering and penalizing nearly half a trillion pesos in state corruption and incompetence. Sen. Panfilo Lacson said this on Sunday even as he expressed disgust over the extent of corruption, which he said is "no small change."

"Thank you and congratulations to COA for diligently performing your mandate. It is disgusting that so much of the State fund is wasted on corruption and incompetence. PHP565.76B in Disallowances, Suspensions and Charges is by no means, small change," he said in a tweet.

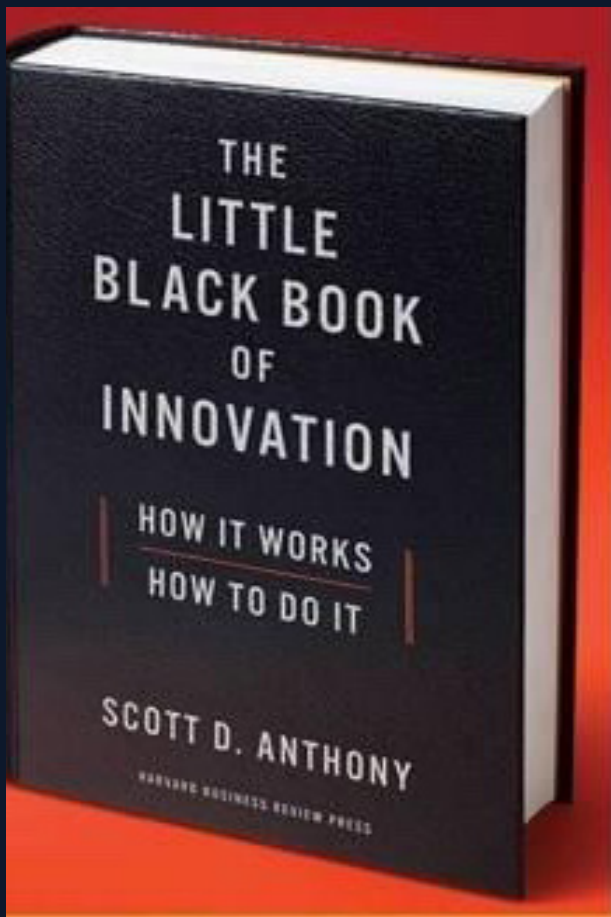

CYNTHIA VILLAR

SENATOR, SENATE OF THE PHILIPPINES

Cynthia Aguilar Villar earned her degree in Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from the University of the Philippines, which recognized her as the 2017 UPAA Most Distinguished Alumna. She completed her Masters in Business Administration at the New York University. In June 2018, she received an honorary doctor of laws (honoris causa) from the University of the Philippines Los Baños (UPLB) for her work in agricultural development, poverty alleviation, education, women and children welfare.

She practiced as a financial analyst and college professor until she married Former House Speaker and Senate President Manny Villar. She supported her husband in various entrepreneurial ventures that eventually led to making Vista Land the biggest homebuilder in the Philippines. She also managed a private development bank from 1989 to 1998.

In 2001, Cynthia Villar won as Representative of Las Piñas, where she completed three terms or nine years of service until 2010. She was Chairman of Committee on Higher and Technical Education during the 13th and 14th Congress. She was President of the Lady Legislators during the 12th, 13th & 14th Congress initiating Legislation benefitting women, children and family.

Cynthia Villar founded and chaired the Villar Foundation (now Villar Social Institute for Poverty Alleviation and Governance or Villar SIPAG). Its various programs are assistance to OFWs including the yearly OFW & Family Summit; environment protection including the establishment of the Las Piñas-Parañaque Wetland Park; agricultural training in four farm schools located in Las Piñas - Bacoor, Bulacan, Iloilo and Davao City; and establishment of various livelihood projects in over 3,000 locations nationwide.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

INNOVATE OR PERISH

There's an old Wayne Gretzky quote that I love. 'I skate to where the puck is going to be, not where it has been. And we've always tried to do that at Apple since the very beginning. And we always will.' – Steve Jobs

My piece last week was on corporate culture. On November 11, Scott Anthony, author of several books on innovation, is our guest speaker. Today's article focuses on fostering an innovation culture

There are famous cases of lackluster innovation. Once the Apple of today, Blackberry's poor design while stubbornly sticking to an OS that nobody was building apps for, led to its demise. While Apple came up with advanced phones regularly, Nokia never kept pace with changing technology and trends. Blockbuster went bankrupt in 2010 and Netflix is now a \$230 billion dollar company, about hundred times what Blockbuster was worth.

A 2018 article by Fast Company lauded Apple as the world's most innovative company, topping the magazine's annual list of the top

50 innovators. Jonathan Livescault, Braineet Innovation Management CEO, offers some rules augmenting Apple's innovation culture.

First, their 'People First' approach is at the heart of Apple's innovation culture. This is illustrated by the constant focus on making things easier and more convenient for people and is why their products are so intuitive and easy to use.

Next, Apple hire smart people, then empower them. The advice from Steve Jobs, "It doesn't make sense to hire smart people and tell them what to do. We hire smart people so they can tell us what to do". **I remember in my IBM days in the U.S., our bosses have the same message, "teach how to think, not what to do, provide guidance and get out of their way and let them handle the rest"**.

The rules that bind Apple's innovation culture works because Jobs was an innovative leader with innovative beliefs: 1. Lead, don't follow; 2. Innovate incessantly; 3. Be unreasonable. Jobs said, "... you can't outperform competitors by living with their trade-offs; reasonable people don't produce breakthroughs".

Jobs was unreasonable and would not accept trade-offs demanding Apple's products to be: 1. High value; 2. Low cost; 3. Gorgeous; 4. Functional. During the unveiling of the iPad, Jobs remarked, "it's just so amazing to hold". Clearly, innovation is not just a strategy, as Apple lives and breathes innovation into everything it does. Examples are the wafer-thin MacBook Air, the Apple Store and the Genius Bar.

Jobs encouraged creativity in three ways. First, shaking up ingrained perceptions, immersing his people to break free of pre-existing views.

Second, by imposing constraints on the business model, he injected a "stark necessity" into an otherwise low-risk exercise with out-of-box thinking. For example, nobody ever questioned a fan as all PC's required a fan to prevent overheating. Jobs would not hear of it; his radical notion was "no fan".

Third, Jobs challenged conventional wisdom and overcome orthodoxies as a way of improving the ability of Apple people to embrace new ideas - innovation, is not just product innovation.

I'm reminded of one Saturday. Tere and I were visiting with our sons and we were in an IKEA store in Seattle. Suddenly, there was a heavy downpour, just when we were about to wheel our cart to a checkout counter.

There were golf umbrellas with the IKEA logo in front of the cashier. Wedged in the umbrella container, was a sign, "Sunny Day \$9 - Rainy Day \$3". Conventional wisdom calls for charging an exorbitant price as customers desiring to keep dry, would buy anyway. IKEA created huge goodwill. I posted on my Facebook complimenting IKEA for its great customer service. I can imagine this act of IKEA for not gouging customers generated a lot of free, credible word-of-mouth advertising.

The Philippines is an innovative nation and ranks 50th among 131 economies in the Global Innovation Index 2020 by the World Intellectual Property Organization. Whilst good, though not great, without wanting to sound too alarmist, **perhaps the time has come to innovate or perish.** In an article, "Innovation in a crisis: it is more critical than ever" by Jordan Bar Am, says, "Prioritizing innovation today is the key to unlocking postcrisis growth."

On a micro level, the opportunity is there for businesses that have been slow to adapt to digital marketing. In a Forbes article, Bernard Marr said, **"Businesses need to become more reliant than ever on their digital strategy.** In many cases, it will be the deciding factor in making it through the tough times ahead".

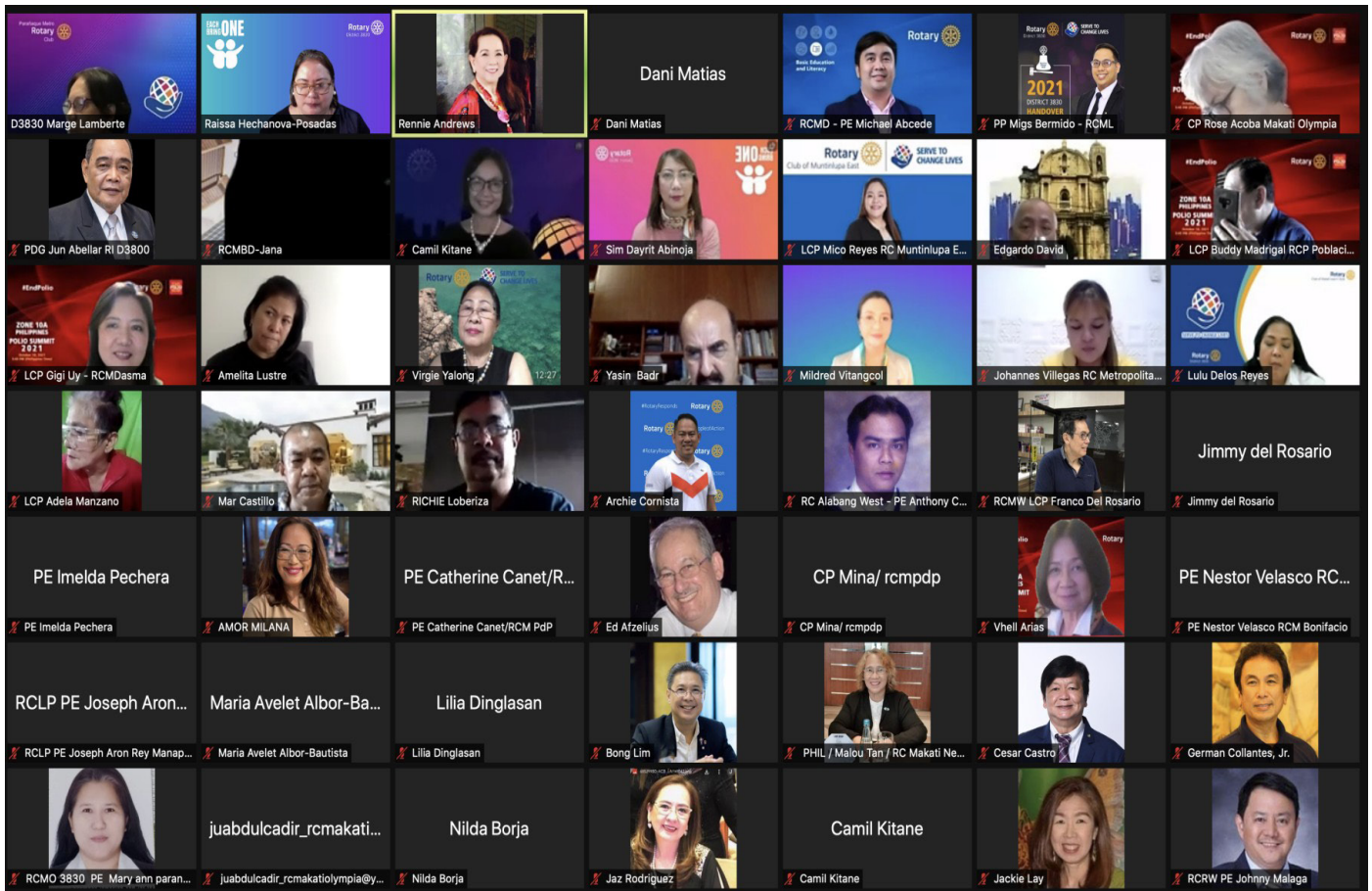

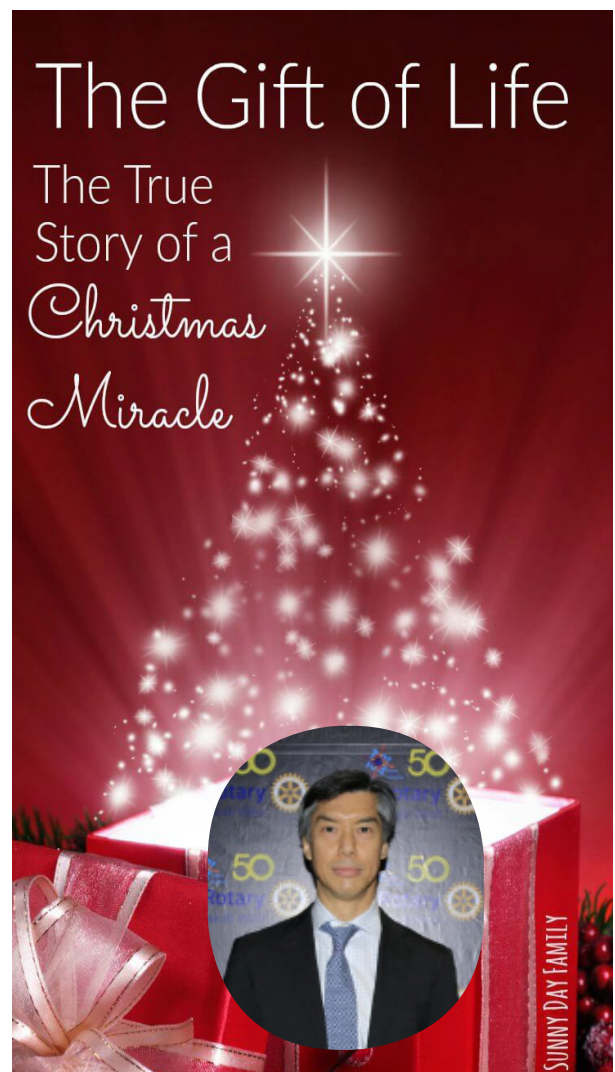
Even during covid, when the hospitals were full, our resources and connections would somehow enable us to manage to get a room when so many other desperate people could not.

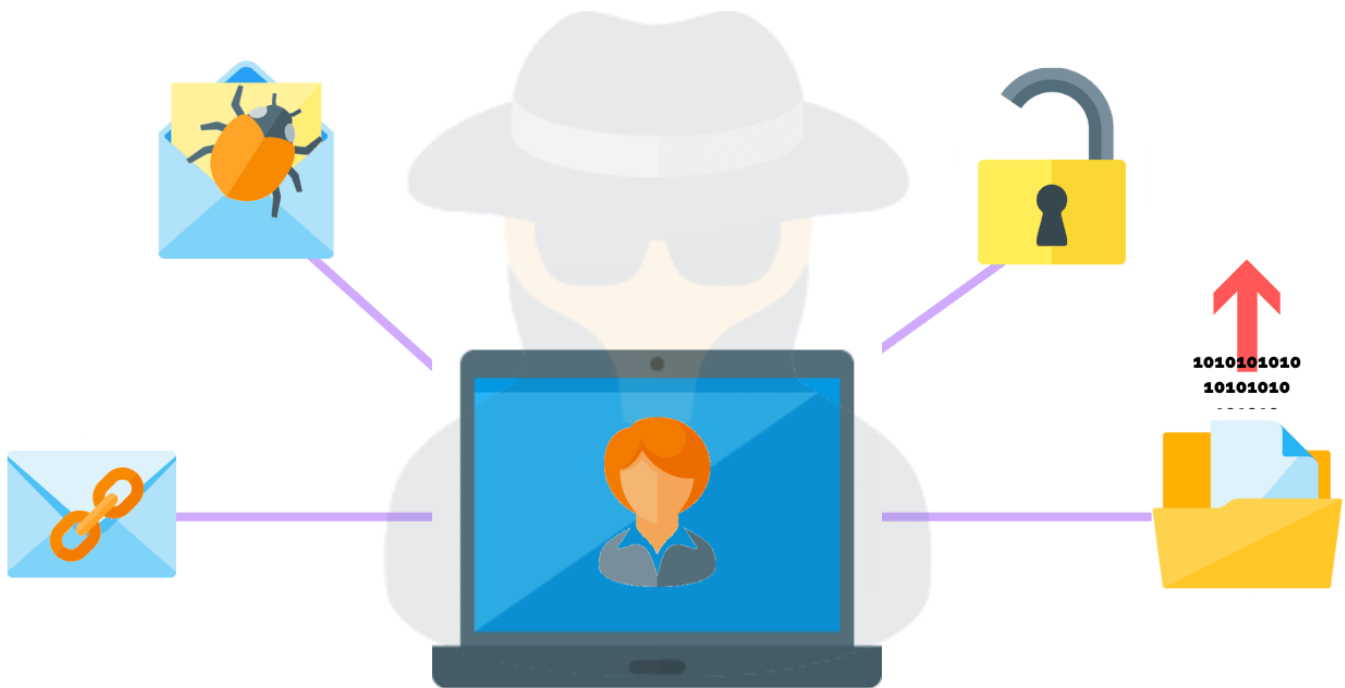

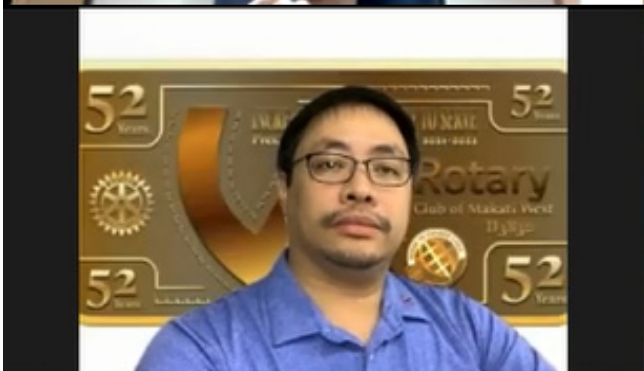
Cybercrime Up 600% Due To COVID-19 Pandemic

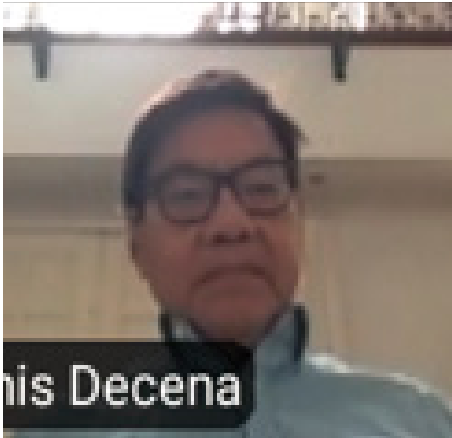
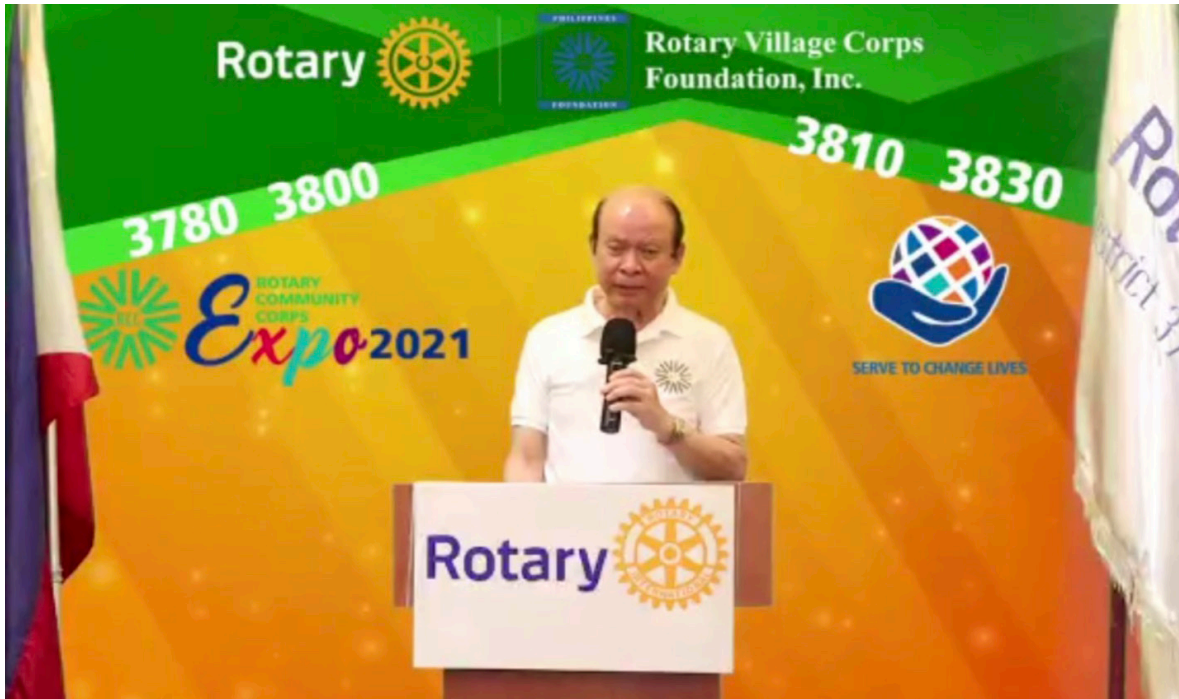
Cybersecurity firm Trend Micro showed that the Philippines ranked fourth globally and second in Southeast Asia in terms of the number of attempts to access a malicious URL. Trend Micro emphasizes the pressing need to elevate the online habits and cybersecurity awareness of Filipinos and business organizations amidst the rise of telecommuting and digital services in the country. With the digital shift in workplaces, daily routines, and proliferation of online-based services brought about by the pandemic, Filipinos are becoming more prone to cyber threats and information technology (IT) attacks.

Here are some tips:

1. Turn on Automatic Update on your devices.
2. Keep your Anti-Virus Software updated.
3. Enable Two Factor Authentication on all your accounts.
4. Secure your device at all times.
5. Think before you click on any links and apps.
6. Update your home wi-fi router.
7. Buy genuine, do not use cracks.
8. Avoid public WiFi. If you have too, make sure it has WPA2 encryption.

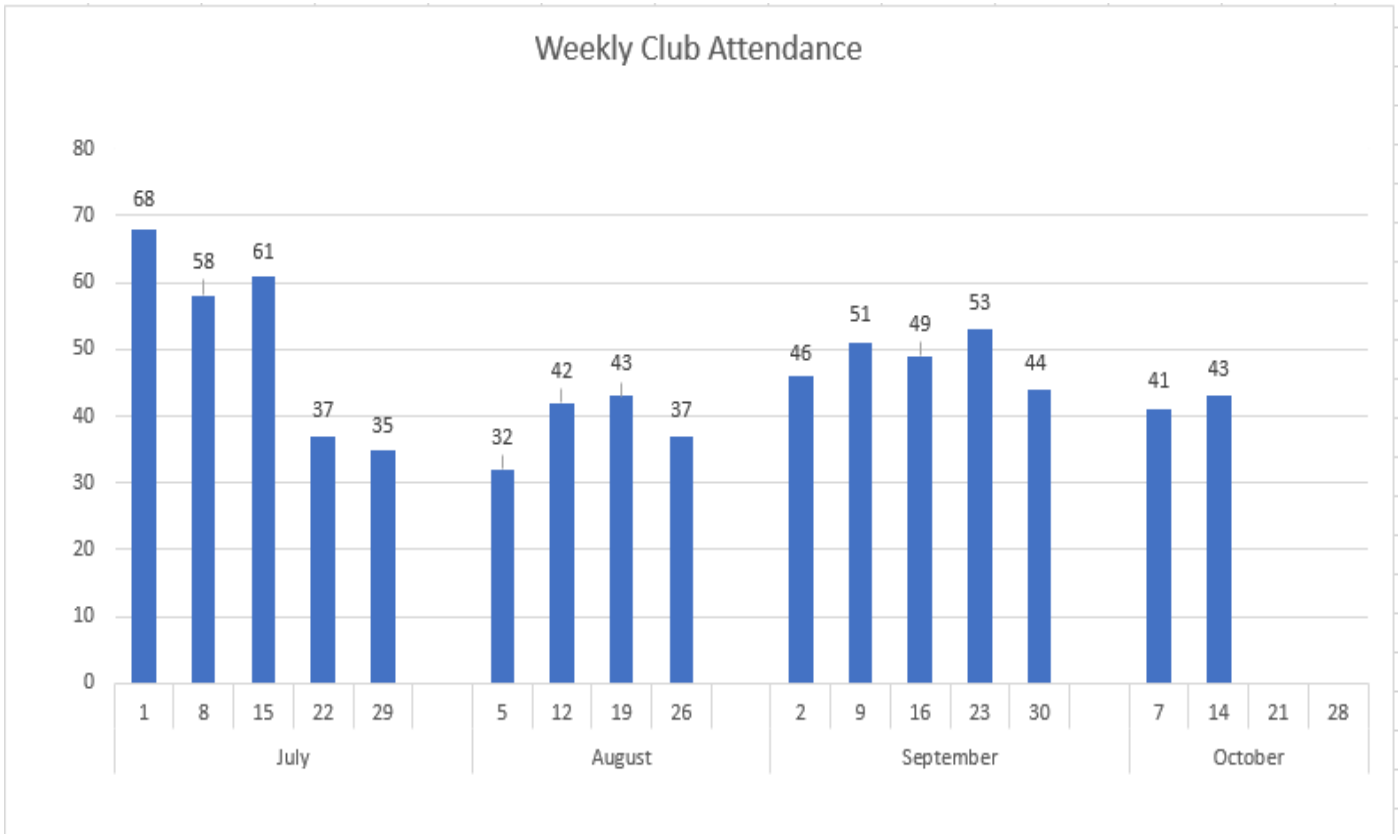

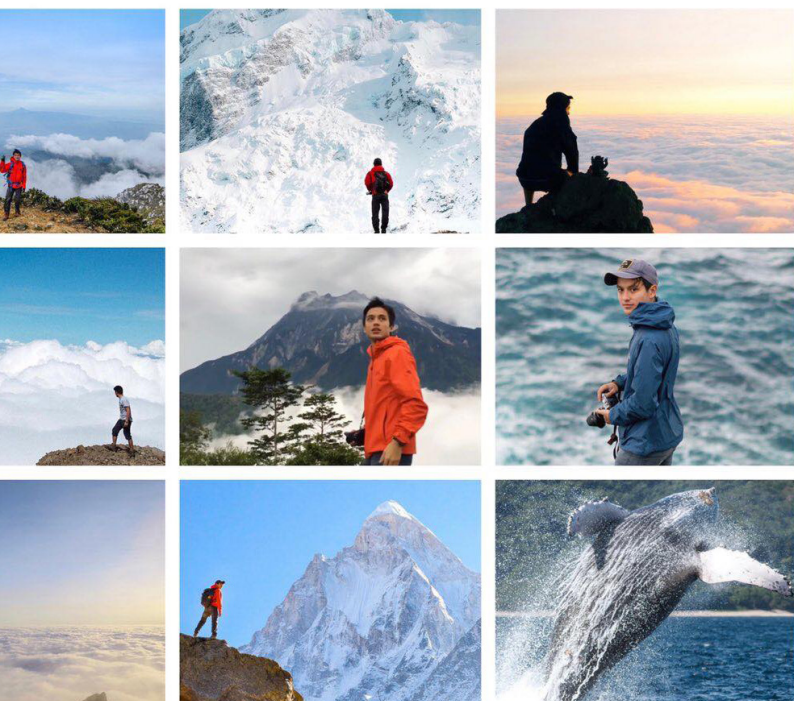

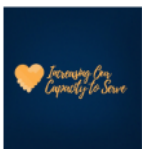
