PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



ALASDAIR J.W THOMSON President, RY 2020 - 2021

Men of Action!,

One of the things that has been gnawing at me this past few weeks, as our country has (supposedly) returned to the strictest level of lockdown, is the long term damage that these actions are having on our society. I'm not referring only to the Philippines but to the world at large.

Since World War II there has been a global trend towards integration, to cultural exchange, a broad movement to remove racism and other forms of discrimination from our societies. It is a slow and tortuous road of course, and the results are far from perfect, but the fact is that this broad movement has prevented large scale war for decades. Countries that trade together, and people who know each other, simply don't fight quite as much.

My concern, shared by many, is that the lasting effect of the reactions to Covid-19 will not be on health but on our societies. When lockdowns prevent you from interacting in person with other humans, when masks prevent you from seeing and expressing emotions, we lose our connectedness. When governments ban travel based on nationality and not based on medical fact, and point implicitly or explicitly at "foreigners" as a source of danger, then they stoke distrust. When the mantra of fear ("assume everyone you meet is a potential covid positive person") becomes normalised, it threatens to create a habit of isolationism and of division that can only lead to greater conflict in the future.

I'm not at all denying that Covid-19 is a serious matter or that it kills. Clearly it does as we have all found to our great sorrow these past weeks. I'm also not arguing that the measures mentioned above (masks, lockdown) are not of benefit in reducing the impact of Covid-19 - they may very well be in the short term. What I am concerned about is their hidden, and long-term cost and effect on our societies. I don't want to live in a world where "fear of death" leads to a "fear of living", or where we slide back to a world of "distrust your neighbour".

This is where our Rotary life can make such a difference. Within our Club we have worked so hard this year to remain connected to each other, and we need to keep doing that. We need to find that hour to chat and joke around in a Fireside Chat. So please do come forward if you'd like to host a chat on a topic that is close to your heart.

Outside our Club it is essential that we keep reaching out to people across our community to help in the ways that we can. For that reason I truly love the idea of IPP Eric to fund ice cream carts for the frontliners at PGH. It is so simple, yet it just connects people.

In the words of my countryman, William Wallace: "Every man dies. Not every man really lives".

Let us focus on really living, and let's do what we can to spread courage, optimism, connectedness and community instead of fear, isolationism and despair.

The Famous Grouse

Although we've focused entirely on Single Malts to this point, I feel we should give some time to a few of Scotland's Blended Whiskies. The Famous Grouse is the biggest selling whisky in Scotland. As with many things in Scotland, there seems to be an invisible line running north to south down the country, that separates many aspects of life. When it comes to whisky, you'll find much more Grouse on the west side of the country and much more Bells on the East side. I've no idea why.

The Grouse is made at the Glenturret distillery just outside Perth. It has a fabulous distillery tour that should be on everyone's list as a visitor (just make sure to take a designated driver to enjoy the experience to the fullest!). They will even make you a bottle with your own name on it. PP Phillin Hagedorn has one in his cabinet!

In addition to Glenturret, the blend contains malt whisky from Highland Park and The Macallan, both of which are owned by the same parent.

Tasting Note by The Chaps at Master of Malt (12y)

Nose: A crisp, light nose offering up notes of toffee apples, hints of dried flowers and biscuity barley.

Palate: Balanced, biscuit-laden palate with a core of thick, creamy malt. Just a hint of spice and the vaguest whisper of smoke really bring a great deal of complexity.

Finish: A slightly sweet, malty finish.



PROFILE

Speaker Lord Allan Velasco (SLAV) is a lawyer by profession. He obtained his undergraduate degree in Business Management from De La Salle University (DLSU) - Manila and his law degree from University of Santo Tomas (UST). He was introduced to public service as a legal researcher in the Supreme Court and pursued this career when he became the Provincial Administrator of Marinduque in 2008. He served as Chairperson of the Marinduque Provincial Tourism Council where he sought to promote sustainable tourism in the province. After his stint as Provincial Administrator, he was elected as the neophyte Representative of the Lone District of Marinduque in 2010.

In 2016, he was appointed Chairperson of the powerful House Committee on Energy where he pushed for sustainable, reliable and affordable energy, and was the main proponent of the Murang Kuryente Act, the Disaster Emergency Fund for Electric Coops Act and the Energy Efficiency & Conservation Act.

SLAV has faithfully served the Lone District of Marinduque. In the 18th Congress, he entered as a veteran lawmaker in his early 40s and became one of the youngest Speakers of the House of Representatives in the new millennium, having the singular ability of balancing tradition and innovative leadership.

During parties, after the TYRROPS had given their names to the party gatekeeper, Tony would always vouch for me, he would point to me and say, "he's with me". Most weekends the TYRROPS would hang out in each other's homes. I still remember hanging out in Tony's parent's home in their Taft Avenue residence in Pasay.

The TYRROPs had an affectionate nickname for Tony, we called him "Ames". PDG Tony had his own nickname for me, he called me, which was "Franken". Every time PDG Tony would see me, and up to the last time I spoke to him last month, PDG Tony would greet me, "hey, Franken!"

Carlos and I went for the equivalent of high school in Ipswich, Suffolk England. It was at the same time, PDG Tony and his brother Guilly studied in Bexleyheath, Kent, England. As our school term breaks coincided, we took flights together to Manila and back. One Christmas holiday, at Heathrow Airport, I was being charged 500 pounds for excess baggage. I didn't know what to do and Tony was kind enough to lend me the money. I remember that flight had a stopover at Bangkok airport and ten minutes past the reboarding time and Tony was still not with the group of transit passenger, a female airline ground attendant stormed the men's room and sure enough found and told him, "Mr. Rufino, we must leave now!". Tony just continued to take several more seconds, carefully combing each strand of his hair.

While studying in England, Tony and his brother Guilly and Carlos and I would travel together. I would always be the roommate of PDG Tony. One time after spending "senmana santa" in Sevilla, during an overnight stay in a Madrid hotel to catch our return flight to London, Tony who had very sensitive skin and it would make him scratch quite a bit. While he was scratching, I would fall asleep and when I happen to wake up in the middle of the night Tony would still be awake scratching. I felt bad for him.

During this current Rotary year, PDG Tony and I would have several phone conversations about membership recruitment—from a landline, of course! Everyone knows one of many of PDG Tony's expertise is in bringing in new members to the club.

PDG Tony is probably rolling his eyes again now because I am taking too long. Our club has really lost a dear friend ,an icon to the Rotary world as he was held in high esteem not just in Makati West by many Rotarians in the Philippines and abroad. So many of my PETS classmates messaged me to extend their condolences.

Tony, we really are all saddened by your sudden departure. I still cannot wrap my head around the fact that I will no longer be speaking to you, You were such a blessing to me. 


